

RURAL RESEARCH CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRAM

Frequently Asked Questions

The Rural Research Capacity Building Program (RRCBP) is funded and operated by the NSW Health Education and Training Institute - Rural and Remote Portfolio. It is an excellent opportunity for rural clinical staff to gain skills in research.

Q. Who can apply for the RRCBP?

Individuals who live in rural New South Wales and are permanent employees of the Northern NSW, Mid North Coast, Far West, Western, Hunter New England (except Newcastle area), Murrumbidgee, Southern NSW Local Health Districts plus Nowra and areas south of Nowra in Illawarra Shoalhaven LHD are invited to submit research questions/topics for consideration. Rurally based staff working for NSW Ambulance, Justice Health and Forensic Mental Health Network and NSW Health Pillars are also eligible. Please contact us if you are unsure of your eligibility.

Please note: Existing researchers or individuals undertaking or who have previously undertaken doctoral level studies or masters by research are **not** eligible to apply. If you are unsure of your eligibility, please contact HETI to discuss this prior to submitting your application.

Q. Is it only for one type of health professional?

The RRCBP is a NSW Health-wide initiative and is open to community health care workers, allied health staff, nurses, doctors, educators, managers, public health officers and staff involved in support services. A strength of the program is the interdisciplinary nature of the candidates who participate.

Q. How long is the program?

The program runs for 22 months starting in January 2018. Candidates will finish in December 2019.

Q. What training is involved?

All candidates undertake a three day course in research methods in February 2018. A second workshop will be conducted over two days in March 2018, with two-day research courses scheduled for candidates in June 2018 and June 2018. Two one-day videoconferences will be scheduled between the July workshops and additional training opportunities will be available to candidates.

Q. What skills do candidates gain?

Through their study and practice candidates learn how to read and review research, prepare research projects, collect and analyse research data and prepare research reports and presentations.

Q. What support is given to candidates?

Candidates are funded to complete their project. This funding is via the LHD for the equivalent of 60 days (30

days per calendar year) of support to assist them in undertaking training and research work. Candidates receive supervision, mentoring and biostatistical support if required. HETI has weekly teleconferences on a range of research topics to help support candidates. Additional leave from regular duties may be negotiated as learning and development leave by candidates in consultation within their LHD.

Q. What are the outcomes of the program?

Every candidate prepares a research report of around 25 pages. Candidates also prepare a refereed journal article and present their research at a state, national or international conference.

Q. Do I receive any award from this program?

There is no specific academic award associated with this program, however a number of Universities offer advanced standing for postgraduate qualifications for completed RRCBP work. A significant number of RRCBP candidates (20 as of July 2017) have gone onto further study including research masters or PhD.

Applications are due by the close of business, **31 October, 2017**. Applicants are advised of the final outcome of the application process by **23 November, 2017**. See application form for LHD and Service contact.
