Welcome to the second edition of the JMO newsletter. This newsletter provides you with information on HETI, events and updates within the prevocational space.



JMO FORUM

Two successful JMO Forums were held in March and August 2019. There was also a JMO session held at the HETI Prevocational Conference in June 2019. The Forums provide opportunities for representatives from each Prevocational Training Network and Rural Hospitals to network, share innovations, discuss and action issues relevant to prevocational supervision, education and training, accreditation and welfare.

In 2019 the Forum is led by a Chair, Dr Thomas Morrison (RPA) and a four member executive. The Executive members are Dr Yvonne Nguyen (St Vincent's Hospital), Dr Jayden Murphy (Tamworth Hospital), Dr Bhavi Ravindran (John Hunter Hospital) and Dr Jeffery Wang (Nepean Hospital). The Executive provide support to the Chair in the leadership of the Forum and lead on the JMO Forum projects.

The Forum is producing several projects of note this year including:

- gauging information about how to increase the quality of ward round based teaching
- providing education regarding rational investigation ordering
- gaining insight into specific PGY2 education needs
- looking at reason's JMOs may feel the need to start before accredited starting times
- continuing the resident to registrar program

Several Forum members will be presenting the above projects at the Australian & New Zealand Prevocational Medical Education Forum in October in Canberra.

The Forum also provides opportunity for JMOs to engage with HETI and other health agencies. One of the roles of the JMO Forum representatives at your networks and rural hospitals is to disseminate information from the Forum to all trainees and bring any initiatives and issues to the Forums. GENERAL CLINICAL TRAINING COMMITTEE (GCTC) MEETINGS

Each prevocational training hospital must have a GCTC. The GCTC is one of the platforms where JMOs can have their say and contribute to changes that can benefit their JMO colleagues.

The GCTC responsibilities is to:

- Develop, implement, monitor and evaluate all orientation, training and educational programs for prevocational doctors
- Ensure that each term, including secondments is consistent with HETI guidelines
- Regularly review and evaluate training, education, experience and working conditions of each prevocational trainee
- Review prevocational training program according to HETI Accreditation Standards

ACCREDITATION SURVEYS

A hospital's accreditation process involves a Survey being conducted at the hospital, typically every four years, to accredit individual clinical terms as well as the hospital as a whole. Surveys are another platform that provides JMOs with an opportunity to voice any concerns or contribute to positive changes to their workplace. The Surveys involve interviews with JMOs as well as other hospital staff. The interviews are confidential and JMOs should feel comfortable providing open and honest feedback about their experience at the hospital.

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HETI PREVOCATIONAL CONFERENCE

In June 2019, HETI held the Prevocational Conference with the theme of 'From Surviving to Thriving'. The Conference ran over two days and focussed on JMO wellbeing.

The conference was open to all Directors of Prevocational Education and Training (DPETs), Prevocational Term Supervisors, JMO Managers, Education Support Officers (ESOs) and JMOs, as well anyone involved with, or interested in, the delivery of quality training and wellbeing of prevocational trainees in NSW.

HETI invited all conference attendees to use this networking opportunity to share initiatives, showcase relevant work and learn more about current NSW initiatives in the prevocational training space.

A range of junior doctors presented on their projects through two concurrent sessions on JMO education, JMO quality and safety and participated in the concurrent JMO session.

Feedback has been extremely positive with participants feeling inspired, having made new connections, and feeling supported. Participants reported that they increased their knowledge of resources, existing skills and learned new skills

MEDICAL TRAINING SURVEY

The Medical Board of Australia Medical Training Survey is currently open and will close on 30 September 2019.

The Medical Training Survey will be run each year to get feedback from doctors in training in Australia (and in time their supervisors) to:

- Better understand the quality of medical training in Australia
- Identify how best to improve medical training in Australia, and
- Recognise and deal with potential issues in medical training that could impact on patient safety, including environment and culture, unacceptable behaviours and poor supervision.

All medical practitioners will be asked if they are a doctor in training at the time of renewal of their general registration. It will automatically include interns and other medical practitioners with provisional or limited registration.

The Board and AHPRA will not receive any information that identifies individuals. The results of the survey will be released in February 2020. Everyone is encouraged to complete the survey.
